1. Activated charcoal (optional*)
2. Acetaminophen (optional*)
3. Adenosine
4. Albuterol
5. Antidysrhythmic – at least one of: amiodarone or lidocaine
6. Antimicrobials (optional* item to be used for interfacility transports only)
7. Aspirin
8. Atropine sulfate
9. Benzocaine - for topical use only (optional*)
10. Benzodiazepine – at least one of: diazepam, lorazepam, or midazolam
11. Bretylium (optional*)
12. Calcium chloride
13. Calcium gluconate (optional*)
14. Captopril (optional*)
15. Dexamethasone sodium phosphate (optional*)
16. Dilaudid – (optional* item to be used for interfacility transports only, must be regulated by an infusion pump if administered as a continuous infusion)
17. Diltiazem (optional*)
18. Diphenhydramine HCL
19. Dobutamine (optional*)
20. Dopamine (optional*)
21. Enalapril (optional*)
22. Epinephrine HCL
23. Etomidate (optional*. Only permitted for services approved by a regional EMS council and participating in the required QI program)
24. Furosemide
25. Glucagon
26. Heparin by intravenous drip – (optional* medication to be used for interfacility transports only, must be regulated by an infusion pump)
27. Heparin lock flush (optional*)
28. Hydrocortisone sodium succinate (optional*)
29. Glycoprotein IIb/IIIa Inhibitors – (optional* medication to be used for interfacility transports only, must be regulated by an infusion pump)
 - Abciximab
 - Eptifibatide
 - Tirofiban
25. Intravenous electrolyte solutions
 - Crystalloid solution: at least one of: Lactated Ringer's or Sodium chloride
 - Dextrose
 - Normosol (optional*)

- Potassium – (optional* item to be used for interfacility transports only, must be regulated by an infusion pump except with potassium concentrations no more than 20 mEq/L)
30. Ipratropium Bromide (optional*)
 31. Isoproterenol HCL – (optional* item to be used for interfacility transports only, must be regulated by an infusion pump)
 32. Levalbuterol – (optional* item to be used for interfacility transports only)
 33. Magnesium sulfate
 34. Methylprednisolone (optional*)
 35. Narcotic analgesic– at least one of: morphine sulfate or fentanyl
 36. Naloxone HCL
 37. Nitroglycerin by intravenous drip – (optional* , must be regulated by an infusion pump)
 38. Nitroglycerin – either nitroglycerin spray or sublingual tablets
 39. Nitroglycerin ointment (optional*)
 40. Nitrous oxide (optional*)
 41. Ondansetron (optional*)
 42. Oxytocin (optional*)
 43. Pralidoxime CL (optional*)
 44. Procainamide (optional*)
 45. Sodium bicarbonate
 46. Sodium thiosulfate
 47. Sterile water for injection
 48. Terbutaline (optional*)
 49. Tetracaine--for topical use only (optional*)
 50. Total parenteral nutrition (optional* , for interfacility transport only, must be regulated by an infusion pump)
 51. Verapamil (optional*)

* ALS services may choose to carry optional medications that are listed on the current State ALS Drug List if these additional medications are approved by the service medical director. ALS services are required to notify the Philadelphia Regional EMS Office in writing regarding which optional medications they use. Individual ALS services are responsible for their personnel’s competency, education, and training in the use of all medications.
