

The City has attracted \$315 million in Recovery Act dollars. However, the City has prime responsibility for managing and reporting on \$248 million on a quarterly basis, with the remaining \$67.2 million administered by quasi-City agencies and PennDOT. The funds are being invested among the five categories below. This document lists all funds applied for, pending and awarded, including goals, jobs created and expenditures.

Jobs Calculations Based on Economic Model

Only direct jobs were reported to the federal government by City departments receiving Recovery (ARRA) funds per Section 1512. Direct jobs are those supported by ARRA dollars and based on a strictly defined criteria set by the Federal Office of Management and Budget.
