Comprehensive User Engagement Sites (CUES)

What are Comprehensive User Engagement Sites, or CUES?

- **CUES** are places designed to prevent people from dying of drug overdose. At a CUES, people with substance use disorders will be able to safely use drugs, like heroin, under supervision while they are encouraged to enter treatment.
- There are no CUES currently in the United States, but more than 100 worldwide.

Why is Philadelphia talking about CUES?

- Philadelphia is in the middle of an opioid crisis. In 2016, 907 people died in Philadelphia from overdose. We expect around 1,200 overdose deaths in 2017.
- In 1984, 935 people died from AIDS in Philadelphia, which was the worst year of the crisis. We saw more overdose deaths than that between January and September 2017.
- 🧗 CUES are designed to **keep people alive** long enough for them to enter treatment.
- 🔭 Research has shown that a CUES in Philadelphia could save up to 76 lives per year.

What do you need to know about CUES?

- CUES do not encourage or condone drug use. They are about making sure people can stay alive long enough to get into treatment.
- CUES do not negatively affect the neighborhoods they are in. Studies show they lead to fewer littered syringes and less open-air drug use.
- **CUES do not worsen crime or drug use**. Police in Vancouver support their site because it saves lives and doesn't create more crime.
- **CUES are not the only thing the City is doing**. We are working with doctors to lessen prescribing, getting more people into treatment, and distributing naloxone to save lives.
- CUES are not about just injecting drugs. **Users are offered access to treatment** and can be revived by trained staff if they overdose.

What happens next?

- The City is working to identify groups to pay for and to operate a CUES. The City does not plan to pay for or operate one.
- The City will meet with organizations and community members. They will discuss how a CUES should function to help the most people.
