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DHS and the Stoneleigh Foundation Announce Fellowship for the Educational Outcomes for Youth in Congregate Care Project

January 7th 2019, Philadelphia, PA – The Philadelphia Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Stoneleigh Foundation are pleased to announce the awarding of a Stoneleigh Fellowship to conduct the Improving Educational Outcomes for Youth in Congregate Care Project. The Fellowship was recently awarded to Kasey Thompson.

The project will be led by DHS and will focus on identifying and developing solutions to systemic barriers that impact education for youth who are placed in congregate care. As a Stoneleigh Fellow, Thompson will work with researchers to analyze education challenges for youth currently in, or recently discharged from, a congregate care setting and to develop new strategies for youth returning from placement. Through this project, DHS will continue to work closely with its system partners, including the School District of Philadelphia, and Family Court.

The Improving Educational Outcomes for Youth in Congregate Care Project furthers DHS commitment to continue reducing congregate care and ensuring quality of service. This project builds on the work of the DHS Education Support Center, which was implemented in 2010 and was also developed through a Stoneleigh Fellowship.

Education stability for children and youth in care is a priority for the department. Both research and conversations with youth who have experienced the system reflect the need to address both education quality and education stability for youth in residential placements.

Support from the Stoneleigh Foundation to strengthen the system's response to education outcomes for youth in congregate care comes at a critical time as Philadelphia DHS looks to continue enhancements of its monitoring and evaluation process for congregate care providers.

Since 2013, DHS has decreased residential placements (congregate care) by 29% for youth in the child welfare system and worked with its partners for a 47% decrease for youth in the juvenile justice system. Right now in Philadelphia 1,073 youth are in residential placements (468 delinquent and 605 dependent)

Philadelphia is below the national and Pennsylvania state averages for the number of youth in residentia placements: 10.6 % of all dependent youth in the care of DHS are in residential placements; and of all Philadelphia dependent youth ages 14-21, 28% are placed in residential settings.

Statement from DHS Commissioner Cynthia F. Figueroa: We are thrilled to have the Stoneleigh Foundation's support to help us address systemic barriers to youth education stability while in residentia facilities.
