10 From what I remember? 11 Yes, absolutely. 12 A. I came out of the club, saw Ms. Morris laying in 13 the street, hunched over, and I helped her. When you say you helped her, how did you help 14 15 her? A. Helped her out of the street and stood her up 16 against the wall, the outside of the bar. 17 Q. When you say you came out of the club, is that 18 the club that you are referring to? 20 No. I worked at Sister's Night Club. Α. Q. Did you know Ms. Morris prior to this incident? 21 A. Just in passing, not personally. 23 Q. Now, when you came out of the club and you saw 24 Ms. Morris, where exactly was she? A. Just past -- it's Chancellor and Juniper. So 25 0007 just past Juniper on Chancellor across from the parking 1 garage between the garage and Key West Night Club. 2 Q. And was she sitting down, was she standing, lying 3 4 down? A. She was lying down and a cab had just pulled 6 away. Q. And was she in the street or was she on the 7 8 sidewalk? A. In the street. Q. 10 You mentioned that a cab had just pulled away. 11 Did you see --A. No. I just saw the cab was there. 12 Did you hear any interaction between Ms. Morris 13 14 and the cab driver? 15 A. No, because we were talking amongst ourselves. 16 So, no. Q. When you say, "we", could you tell me who? 17 A. Just staff. I don't remember who the staff 18 19 members were. I don't know who was there at the time. Q. Other than yourself, was there anyone else that 20 21 helped you pick Ms. Morris up? A. Yes, my partner Trish and Paul from the parking 23 garage. 24 Q. How did Paul get involved in helping you to 25 assist Ms. Morris? 8000 A. I believe we called him over because we are 1 2 friendly with him. 3 Q. And he was outside standing? 4 A. He is always outside. Q. I understand. A. He would kind of watch the staff coming out at the end of the night. Q. Other than you, Trish and Paul, is there anyone else that you know of that assisted you in helping 10 Ms. Morris? A. No. 11 Q. And you said that you placed her against the wall 12 13 of the club? 14 A. You have to realize, she was about 2 feet taller 15 than me. So, yeah. I had to do that. Q. A gentleman had tried to steal her purse. I 17 18 believe that's when we called Paul and he ran after and got her purse back. It was just stabilizing her and making sure she was okay. 20

- Q. As best as you can recall, do you remember the conversation that you had between you and Ms. Morris?
- 23 A. We didn't have much of a conversation except for, are you okay? She just wanted to go home.
- 25 Q. Was that her response to your question, when you 0010
- 1 asked, are you okay?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Her response was, I just want to go home?
- A. Yes.
- Q. When you said she was a little exposed, how would 5 you frame her condition at the time? Do you believe she was intoxicated?
- A. No. Only because I didn't smell alcohol. Being at my height and the proximity to her head and my head, I 9 don't recall smelling alcohol. 10

But I honestly wasn't concerned about that. I wanted her covered up. But, I don't recall smelling alcohol.

- Q. Did you ask Ms. Morris at all why she was in the 14 street lying down or anything of that nature? 15
- 16 A. I don't recall asking that.
  - Q. And she didn't provide a suggestion as to --
- 18 No.
- Q. Now, you mentioned that a gentleman came and took 19 her purse and Paul went to retrieve her purse. 20
  - A. Yes.
- 22 Were you on site to see the gentleman steal her 23 purse?
- A. Yeah. I think as we were picking her up, that's 25 when he tried to take off with her purse. So we had her 0011
- stay when he went to get that back. 1
- Q. What did you do after you were able to stand 3 Ms. Morris up and ask her questions to which she responded?
- A. Trying to find out where she lived. She wasn't answering me at first. She said she had money for a cab, but the cab wouldn't take -- wouldn't take her in her condition. There wasn't much talking, and then the officer pulled up. So there wasn't really much 9 conversation except for, are you okay. 10
- 11 Q. I understand if you don't recall, but you mentioned the cab wouldn't take her in her condition. 12
  - How would you describe her condition?
- 14 She wasn't able to stand up. Did she tell you why she wasn't able to stand up? 15 Q.
  - A. No.

- 16 17 Q. Do you have any reason to believe why she wasn't 18 able to stand up?
- A. I don't want to speculate why she couldn't stand

- 20 up. I don't know anything of where she was prior to that. So it is not my business to say what was the reason. Q. When you say the cab wouldn't take her because she wasn't able to stand up, that's the reason why you 23 24 believe a cab wouldn't take her? 25 A. Right. Correct. 0012 Q. And you mentioned, at some point, the police 2 arrived? 3 4 Q. Did you call the police? 5 A. No. Q. Do you know who did? A. I believe it was somebody who was leaving the 8 bar, but I have no idea. Q. And at some point, the police arrived; is that 10 correct? 11 A. Yes. Q. At the time that the police arrived, as best you 12 13 can recall -- were you there when the police arrived? Yes, I was still there. 14 A. 15 Q. Was there anyone else there other than Trish, you and Paul at the time that the police arrived? A. I don't think so, but I honestly don't remember. 17 18 I only remember the three of us there. I don't remember anybody else, everybody left. 19 20 Q. When you were assisting Ms. Morris to her feet, 21 did you notice any scratches or bruises or scraps or 22 anything of that nature? 23 A. Not at all. 24 What happened once the police arrived? The officer was talking to her, and that's when 25 0013 she was saying that she wants to go home. She asked where 1 she lived, and it sounded like 15th and Walnut. It sounded like 15th and Walnut, I'm not going to say for sure. That's what we all heard. 4 Q. And then what happened? A. The last thing I remember was helping her get into the car. She was upset. She thought she was in 7 8 trouble. We said, you're not in trouble. We just want to get you home. 9 Q. Can you describe for the Panel the police officer 10 11 that arrived on the scene? A. A young female. Other than that, I don't 12 13 remember. 14 Q. Do you recall her name? 15 A. No. Q. Did anyone help Ms. Morris get into the police 16 17 car? 18 Q. Did the officer also assist you and Paul in 19 20 helping Ms. Morris get into the police car? A. I don't remember. I just remember making sure she didn't hit her head because of her height. I just wanted to make sure she didn't hit her head on the door. That's all. I don't remember. I think she was afraid. 24 So, we just said, are you okay? You're going to go home. 25 0014
- 1 Q. So your assistance in helping her was not because 2 she wasn't able to walk or talk. It was just to make sure 3 she didn't hit her head, and making sure she was 4 comfortable with getting assisted from the police officer?
- 5 A. Giving that it was hard for her to stand to begin 6 with, I wanted to make sure -- I hit my head on the door 7 just being careless. So I wanted to make sure she 8 doesn't.
- 9 Q. Did you assist Ms. Morris in walking to the 10 police car?
  - A. It was only a couple of steps, yeah. She had her

- 12 arm around me and yeah.
- 13 Q. And did you take that to mean that she wasn't 14 able at that time to walk on her own, or did you take that 15 as something else?
- 16 A. Maybe not steadily. She had very high heels on.
- 17 Q. Speaking of high heels, do you recall what else 18 Ms. Morris was wearing?
- 19 A. A skirt and a little jacket is all I remember.
- Q. What happened after Ms. Morris finally was ableto get into the police car?

  - were interviewed by the officers, I don't recall having anything to do with it. Honestly, nobody helped. I can tell you that much. She might say she knew what was happening, but she wasn't even there. At least when the officer was there, it was just the four of us.
  - Q. Were the clubs in the area letting out around that time? Were they closing around that time?
- 8 A. The clubs had been closed. By the time we get 9 done cleaning up, taking out trash, counting our tips out, 10 it's a good 45 minutes after the clubs closed.
- 11 Q. If I understand you correctly, you're suggesting 12 there may have been some foot traffic, people going back 13 and forth, but no one that really assisted you, Paul and 14 Trish?
- A. At that time, there is usually not a lot of foot traffic, except for just people who wander around the city. We close at 2, everybody is out by 2:15 at the latest. We clean up by 2:45 and leave. There is not usually a lot of people milling around at that time.
  - So there wasn't a lot of foot traffic.
- Q. Do you know if you, Trish or Paul told the police
   officer that arrived at the scene about the gentleman who
   tried to take Ms. Morris's purse?
- 24 A. I'm sure we did, yes.
- 25 Q. And I would imagine by the time the police 0017
- 1 arrived, he was gone?
- A. Yeah, he was long gone. I think Paul scared him away when he ran after him to get the purse. I had never

Unstable is a good word, yeah. Q. Did you observe her fall back to the ground at 8 the time you picked her up? A. No. I held her up. I wasn't going to let her fall to the ground. Q. So did you ever observe her fall back to the 11 12 ground at all? A. No. I think she sat down at one point. 13 14 Q. Sat on the ground? 15 Yeah. Q. So in your opinion, without your assistance in 16 picking her up from the ground, was she physically able to 17 stand up on her own, without your assistance, in your opinion? 19 A. I think I assisted her anyway. So I wouldn't 20 21 know the difference. Q. You also indicated that you had not asked her if 23 she had any medical problems or was she assaulted or someone hit her or knocked her down or anything of that 24 25 nature? 0024 A. Not that I recall. 1 Q. She didn't tell you how she was feeling, like, I 2 feel ill or anything of that nature? 3 A. Not that I recall. She just said she didn't want to get into trouble and I want to go home. 5 Q. Did she indicate if she needed any medication? A. Did I ask that? 8 Q. Right. Did she indicate that she needed medication or anything of that nature? 9 A. I didn't ask that, no. Q. Prior to her being put in the police car, and 11 12 after the police car left with her in the car, did you observe, was there an ambulance ever, did you observe an 13 ambulance? 14 15 I never saw one, no. Q. At that time that you saw her on the ground, to 16 the time that she was placed in the police officer's 17 vehicle, if you can recall, how much time had elapsed, from your first observation to her being put in the police 19 20 vehicle? 21 A. It's hard to say because it felt like a long 22 time, but situations like that tend to -- I don't know, maybe 15 minutes, maybe 20. I don't know. MR. RODGERS: Thank you, Ma'am. No 24 25 further questions.

Somebody had told us the cabs wouldn't take her. So again, we just stood there.

The police arrived, and she asked what was going on. She asked if we need rescue. We weren't, sure. She 10 couldn't even answer. All she kept saying, I want to go 11 12 home, I want to go.

She had told us that she lived at 15th and 14 Walnut. The police asked if she wanted to go to the hospital. All she kept saying is, I want to go home. So we helped her, after the police said they were going to give her a ride, into the back of the car.

She thought she was in trouble. We let her know 19 that she was not in trouble, that she was just going to give you a ride home. We put her in the car and that was it.

   the morning. Do you recall leaving the club at that time?

    Street?
      A. Yes.

      Q. What time were you driving down Walnut Street?

A. I'm not completely sure. It was between,

- 14 probably, 3:15 and 4 a.m. 15 Q. Did anything happen when you were driving down Walnut Street? 16 A. Before the intersection for, I think, 16th 17 Street, I could see into traffic ahead of me. The traffic 19 was moving into the left lane. Then, when I got up to certain point, there was a car stopped and in the righthand lane. Walnut Street is a one way street. 21 Q. And it's two lanes of traffic that both go west; 23 is that right? 24 A. Yes. Q. So as you were proceeding up Walnut Street, in 25 0058 the right-hand lane, you saw that cars were moving over to 1 2 the left-hand lane; is that right? A. Yes. Q. And you did proceed into the left-hand lane? Well, I wanted to turn to get into the left-hand Α. lane, a police car went passed. Then I moved behind the 6 police car. Q. Were the police car's lights on; at that time? 8 q A. Their head lights? 10 Q. Their siren lights. 11 Α. No. Q. Did you hear the police sirens? 12 13 A. No. Q. After the police car passed on the left-hand 14 15 side, what did you do? A. I moved into the lane behind the police car. He 16 was just going to keep going on Walnut Street. 17 Q. How long did you follow the officer down Walnut? Not far. His car went passed the cars in the 19 20 right-hand lane. And then he stopped and we stopped. Q. For the record, what we have here is in the left-21 hand lane of Walnut Street, a stopped police car and your 23 car stopped behind the police officer's vehicle? 24 A. Yes Q. And did the car have its lights on? 25 0059 A. I don't recall. 1 Q. Do you recall seeing red lights? 2 3 A. I don't recall. Q. Where were you in relation to the intersection of
  - 16th and Walnut Streets when you had to stop your vehicle?
    A. I would say that I was -- I'm not sure. It may

  - have been four car lengths back from the intersection.
  - Q. And when you stopped behind the police officer's vehicle, where was the stopped car in the right-hand lane
  - in relation to your vehicle?
- A. The car was close to my passenger's door. 11 12
- Okay. So you were a little bit ahead of the parked vehicle in the right-hand lane? 13
- 14
  - A. Yes.
- 15 What happened next?
- A. I don't know what order this happened, but the 16
- police officer got out of his car and went to walk across 17
- the intersection of Walnut and 16th Street. I noticed
- there was a woman lying in the street in front of the car 19 20 that was stopped.
- I don't know if I noticed her first, or if the 21 police officer got out of his car first. 22
- Q. How long, approximately, was your car stopped when you first noticed the officer getting out of his 24 25 vehicle?
- 0060
- A. He stopped his car and got out immediately and I was stopped behind him.
- Q. Just before the officer started to exit the
- vehicle, you noticed there was a woman lying in the street
- in the right-hand lane and she was lying in front of the

parked vehicle to your right? 8 Q. Can you describe the woman that was lying in the street? 9 A. She was an African-American woman. She seemed 10 pretty tall. She was dressed almost all in black with 11 leggings and boots, but I couldn't see her face. Why couldn't you see her face? 13 Her head was turned, her faced was turned. 14 15 Q. She was facing 16th Street? A. Yes. Her body was straight on the street, but 16 her head was turned north. 17 Q. Were her arms at her sides? 18 19 No. I recall that they were out from her body. 20 Q. Was she lying flat or were either of her legs up 21 or bent? 22 A. Well, I think that one of her legs was straight, 23 and the other one was bent somewhat over the leg that was 24 straight. 25 Q. Did you see her move at all? 0061 Q. At that moment, did you have any thoughts or 3 ideas as to what might have happened to this women lying in the street? A. Well, I thought she had been hit by the car that was stopped beside my car. 6 Q. What made you think that? A. Just because the car was there and she was lying 8 9 in front of it. Q. How far in front of the car was she lying? 10 I don't recall. 11 Can you give an approximation? 12 If I had to guess, I would say from the sole of 13 14 her shoe on her extended leg to the front bumper of the car, five or six feet. Q. Did you notice whether the drive of the vehicle 16 17 was still inside of the vehicle? A. No one was in the vehicle. 18 Q. Did you notice anyone looking or standing on the 19 20 corner or standing around the intersection? A. No. I looked because of what I assumed 21 happened. I thought the police would talk to the driver of 22 the car that was stopped. So I looked to see if that was happening and I didn't see that happen. 24 25 Q. Can you describe the officer who jumped out of 0062 the vehicle in front of you? 1 A. I would have to say that he was at least six feet 3 tall. Q. Was he white, African-American? 5 A. He was white. 6 Q. Did you see his hair? No. A. 8 Q. What did he do when he exited the vehicle? A. He walked across the intersection of Walnut and 9 16th Street where the ambulance was parked. 10 Q. Where was the ambulance parked? 11 A. In the left-hand lane on the north side of 16th 12 13 Street. Q. Were there any siren lights on this parked 14 15 ambulance? No, there wasn't. 16 Q. When the police officer walked across the 17 intersection, did he go over to the woman that was lying in the street? 19 20 A. No. He walked past where she was lying to the stopped ambulance. 21

Q. In the mean time, was anyone tending to the woman

22

lying in the road?

- 24 No. 25 What happened next, after that officer reached Q. 0063 the ambulance? 1 A. I don't recall. The next thing that I recall is 3 two paramedics exiting the ambulance. Q. How long after you stopped did that happen? A. I would say about five minutes. 6 You saw two paramedics exiting the ambulance? Q. 7 A. Yes. 8 Q. And what did they do next? They wheeled the gurney over to the woman who was 9 A. 10 lying in the street. Q. Did you notice whether the woman was wearing a 11 12 jacket when she was lying there? A. I didn't notice if she was wearing a jacket, but 13 14 she was put on the gurney and a jacket was put over her 15 head. 16 Q. You saw it was put over her head? 17 A. Her face and chest. So you couldn't see her face any longer? 18 Q. A. I didn't see her face at the scene, but the 19 jacket was placed over her head. Q. At any point, did you see whether the woman had a 21 22 purse? 23 A. No, I didn't. 24 Q. The jacket that was placed over the woman's face, 25 did you see what type of a jacket it was? 0064 A. I think it was like a short black bomber jacket. 1 2 And that color was black? Q. 3 Yes. Α. Q. What were the police doing when the paramedics came out of the ambulance with the gurney? 5 A. I don't know. Q. Let me ask you this: Before the paramedics placed the woman on the gurney, did you see them tend to 8 9 her in any way; do you recall? A. No. 10 Q. Did you see them put a neck stabilizer on her? 11 12 I don't recall. Q. Did the paramedics -- how did the paramedics put 13 14 the woman on the gurney? A. One of the paramedics held her under her arms, 15 and the other one held her legs and they swung her on the 16 17 Q. Did you hear any discussion between her or among 18 the paramedics? 19 A. Nothing. 20 Q. And at this point, did the officer place the 21 22 jacket on the woman? A. After she was on the gurney. 23 24 Q. What happened next? 25 I don't recall the next events after that. The 0065 police officer started his car and let the traffic through. I wasn't delayed there after she was placed in the ambulance. 3 Q. Did you see the ambulance pull off? 5
  - A. I don't recall.
- Did you ever see lights on this ambulance? 6 Q.
  - A. No.
- 8 Q. Did you ever see siren lights on the police car
- 9 ahead of you?
- 10 A. No.
- Q. Did you ever hear sirens? 11 12
  - A.
- Q. But at some point, the woman was placed on the 13
- 14 gurney, and did you see the ambulance take off?
- A. I don't recall.

Q. After the officer let traffic through, did he 16 17 pull away? 18 A. Yes. He got back in his car. Q. Did you at, any point, see the officer with 19 20 anyone other than the paramedics? 21 A I don't recall 22 Q. Was there a line of cars behind you at this 23 point? A. I don't recall. 24 25 Q. After the officer pulled forward to let traffic 0066 resume, did you continue on Walnut Street or did you turn 1 up 16th Street? A. No. I continued down Walnut Street. 3 Q. Did you contact the police regarding what you saw that early morning or did the police contact you? 5 A. No. Have you ever given a statement to the police concerning this incident, and what were the circumstances 8 of that statement; did someone contact you? A. No. The following weekend, I saw an article in 10 11 the newspaper. The article explained this woman had been 12 injured and died two days later in the hospital, and requested that if anyone who had any information and left 13 14 contact information. Q. And you read the article, and did you make the 15 contact and speak with a person and did the contact, and a 16 17 attorney contact you? A. Yes. 18 Q. And you sat down and did an interview with that 19 20 attorney? 21 A. Yes. Q. And you told him everything that you saw early 22 23 that morning? 24 A. Yes. Q. Are there any other details or information that 25 0067 you think would be important for the Panel to know about 1 what you saw that morning on Walnut Street? A. I don't recall any other details. 3 4 MR. HAYES: No further questions. 5 BY MR. YOUNG: Q. As you passed upon the article that you read a couple of days later regarding the incident, you later learned that the young lady was Nizah Morris; is that 9 correct? 10 A. Yes. Q. Had you had any contact with Ms. Morris prior to 11 this incident? 12 A. I knew her to see her, but I never spoke with 13 14 her. Q. Did you ever see her have any disagreements or 15 run-ins with any police officers? 16 17 No. Q. Other than the male police officer that you 18 described, were there any other police at the scene? 19 A. I don't remember. 20 Q. And to clarify, you didn't speak with the police 21 22 at the scene; is that correct? 23 A. Correct. Q. And the police didn't ask to speak with you at 24 25 the scene? 0068 Q. You mentioned that car that was to your right and 3 that the car stopped, maybe not parked, and there was no one in the car; is that correct? A. Yes. Q. Did you ever see anyone go back to the car at

all?

A. I didn't. 8 Q. Did it seem that the car was parked there or 9 10 stopped there? A. It seemed like it was parked there. 11 Was it in a lot, a parking area? 13 Α Q. And I'm not familiar with that area. Is there 14 15 parking on that side of the street where the car was parked? 16 17 18 Q. So the car was parked -- would have been illegally parked? 19 Ă. Yes. 21 Q. When you had stopped at the scene because the 22 police stopped in front of you, do you recall whether the ambulance was already on the scene? 24 A. I believe it was. 25 So the police didn't pull off after you arrived? 0069 A. Correct. Q. How much time elapsed between the time that you 3 had to stop at the scene, and at the time you were able to leave the scene? A. I don't know exactly. Q. If you could give me an estimate. Was it less than ten minutes? A. I would say it was less than fifteen minutes. 8 Q. Now, you may have already testified to this, but while you were at the scene, Ms. Morris was being 10 transferred to the ambulance and put on the gurney. 11 Was there anything else that the paramedics were 12 doing? Did you notice that they took a pulse? 13 Did they do anything that seemed to be a medical 14 15 procedure? A. There wasn't anyone there when I stopped my car. 16 When the paramedics wheeled the gurney over, I remember them putting her on the gurney. 19 Q. No checking of the pulse, no heart beats, nothing like that? 20 A. No. 21 22 Q. During the time that the paramedics were transporting Ms. Morris to the ambulance, what was the 23 police officer doing? 24 25 A. I don't remember. 0070 Q. Do you recall whether he was talking to anyone in the other vehicles that happened be on the street at the 2 time? 3 A. I don't believe so. I don't recall. 5 Q. Do you recall, either prior to you leaving or when you were pulling off, whether there were any other vehicles that were stopped in front of Ms. Morris? A. I didn't see anyone. 8 9 Q. And no one went to the car at all? 10 A. Not that I saw at all. Did you see the police going to the car? 11 Q. 12 A. You were interviewed by an attorney from the 13 office of Civil Rights or Civil Liberties? 15 A. Q. Do you know whether that attorney or anyone else 16 17 ever gave you a name to any police detective of the police department? 18 A. They must have because I was interviewed by the 19 police sometime afterwards and they took a statement. 20 MR. YOUNG: I have no further 21
