Report no. 2 | May 15 - June 5, 2020

This is the second installment in a series describing Philadelphia's jail population throughout the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Data are collected weekly to closely monitor the population. In addition to the pandemic, George Floyd was murdered by police in Minneapolis on May 25, prompting protests in Philadelphia which resulted in additional arrests. During this period, the population increased by 249 people (3,750 on 5/15 - 3,999 on 6/5) and 3 out of 4 individuals in jail were Black. Included in the report are areas in which the increase was most prevalent, confinement categories in which an increase occurred, cash bail disparities, and changes in demographics. Subsequent reports will be released.






Proportion of Black and Latinx People in Each Confinement Category | June 5








The number of Black people grew by 109 in the Philadelphia Detainers Only + Open Cases from May 15 - June 5; this was the largest increase across Confinement Categories




