Report no. 3 | June 5 - July 10, 2020

This is the third installment in a series describing Philadelphia's jail population throughout the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Data are collected weekly to closely monitor the population. In addition to the pandemic, George Floyd was murdered by police in Minneapolis on May 25, prompting protests in Philadelphia which resulted in additional arrests. During this period, the population decreased by 177 people (3,999 on 6/5 - 3,822 on 7/10) and 3 out of 4 individuals in jail were Black. Included in the report are areas in which the decrease was most prevalent, confinement categories in which a decrease occurred, cash bail disparities, and changes in demographics. Subsequent reports will be released.






Proportion of Black and Latinx People in Each Confinement Category | July 10






The largest change across confinement categories was the volume decrease of Black people in Pretrial Non-Murders - No Detainers


