



Philadelphia COVID-19 Restaurant & Gym Relief Fund

IMPACT REPORT





Background

To support small businesses that were among the most impacted by pandemic-related restrictions enacted in November 2020, the Philadelphia Department of Commerce partnered with PIDC to create the COVID-19 Restaurant and Gym Relief Program (RGRP). The program was made possible through a transfer of City General Fund dollars by City Council in December 2020.

RGRP provided grants of up to \$15,000 to eligible businesses with less than \$2 million in 2019 revenue. Eligible businesses were limited to restaurants with indoor dining, gyms, and businesses whose primary activity is indoor exercise. Businesses could use the funds to continue operations, including rent or payroll. In addition, investments were encouraged in outdoor winterization, indoor ventilation, and other COVIDrelated indoor physical space expenses.

Applications were accepted from January 28-February 9, 2021. In total, 914 businesses received grants. The average grant size was \$13,200, and \$12.1 million in total funding was given to businesses in need.

Grantee Spotlight

Yanako is a Japanese restaurant and sushi bar in Manayunk that

has been operating for over a decade. The pandemic forced the restaurant to lay off over 60 percent of its staff and only provide delivery through third party services. Thanks to RGRP, Yanako was able to hire and train staff, create an in-house delivery service, and increase outdoor seating capacity.





GymRatz Athletics is a fitness center in West Philadelphia

that offers personal training, group classes, and nutritional counseling. Established by a Philadelphia police officer, the gym opened its current location shortly before the pandemic in late 2019. RGRP helped GymRatz Athletics with employee payroll, office renovation, gym equipment, HVAC repairs, and electrical system repair.

Business Demographics



BUSINESS CATEGORY

Industry

80 percent of grant recipients were restaurants. This industry was particularly devastated by the pandemic, forcing dramatic shifts in business operations and requiring greater focus on less lucrative sources of revenue (such as take-out food).

20 percent of grant recipients were gyms or indoor exercise facilities. In response to the pandemic, many of these businesses shifted to online services or reduced hours for in-person service.

Business Size

RGRP focused its relief efforts on small businesses, which are the backbone of Philadelphia's local economy. The majority of grant recipients reported 2019 revenue totals between \$300,000 and \$600,000.

Revenue Losses

Grant recipients reported an average annual revenue of \$527,101 in 2019, compared to \$282,615 in 2020. The average revenue loss was \$244,486 (a decrease of 46 percent).

The average gym that received a grant reported more revenue loss from 2019 to 2020 than the average restaurant. This likely reflects the continued closure of some gyms and indoor exercise facilities without alternative revenue sources.

Employment Losses

Overall, businesses that received grants lost nearly half of their employees due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The average business lost 2.43 full-time employees and 2.24 part-time employees.

Grant funding was prioritized for minority-owned businesses, businesses located in areas with high poverty rates, and businesses that suffered physical damage during the civil unrest in 2020.

According to self-reported demographic information, nearly 60 percent of grant funding was given to minority-owned businesses while over a third was given to womenowned businesses. In addition, 43 businesses (5 percent) were LGBTQ-owned and 99 businesses (11 percent) were immigrant-owned.

Geographic Distribution

This map displays the businesses that received grant funding by zip code. Awards stretch across 59 zip codes in Philadelphia. Although there is a high concentration of restaurants downtown, 81 percent of awards went to businesses located outside of Center City.

About half (49 percent) of grant funding was given to businesses in neighborhoods with a poverty rate above 20 percent, and nearly a quarter (23 percent) went to neighborhoods with a poverty rate above 25 percent.







COVID-19 Restaurant & Gym Relief Fund

The Philadelphia Department of Commerce conducted a survey of businesses that received grant funding in order to assess expectations for future business performance, as well provide feedback on program design and accessibility. A total of 387 businesses responded, representing a 42 percent response rate.

Business Expectations

The survey found that business owners were largely confident about their ability to weather the COVID-19 crisis. 46 percent of respondents reported feeling extremely or very confident their businesses will survive, with another 43 percent saying they are somewhat confident.
