- E. THE MEASURES INSTALLED FOR EACH JOB.

RESPONSE:

- A. The LICAP contractor has experienced increases in the cost of direct installation materials and subcontractor work. The LICAP contractor continues to honor the original contract \$300 per audit fee and \$4250 in administrative costs per month, absorbing the increased costs of materials and labor.
- B. Inflation has not impacted the number of jobs completed the past year because the contractor did not pass these costs on to the Water Department. Total customer visits have remained consistent as evidenced from LICAP program overviews for FY 2020, FY 2021 and FY 2022 attached as response attachment PA-II-7B.
- C. It is unknown how inflation will impact the number of jobs completed in the next two years. Program summary for FY23 to date, provided as response attachment PA-II-7C, indicates jobs will be on par with prior fiscal years. In addition, efforts to increase TAP participation may result in additional audits depending on how many customers are enrolled.
- D. As we evaluate the costs the LICAP program, we anticipate increased audit fees or different fee structure to cover increased costs associated with inflation. This is likely to require an increase in the budget.

E. The current LICAP contractor has not limited the quantity or variety of measures installed to control costs. PWD is billed for each appointment rather than by conservation measure installed.
