1	MR. WIENER: My name is Edward
2	Wiener, Chief of Source Registration for
3	Air Management Services of the
4	Philadelphia Department of Public
5	Health. Please note that this public
6	hearing is being recorded.
7	We are here to accept testimony
8	on a proposed Natural Minor Operating
9	Permit for Evergreen Resources Group,
10	LLC located at 2700 3144 Passyunk
11	Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa 19145. This
12	hearing was published in the notices
13	section of the Pennsylvania Bulletin on
14	Saturday, March 5, 2022.
15	This proposed Natural Minor
16	Operating Permit, No. OP17-00056, is for
17	the operation of the existing facility.
18	The facility includes the following
19	sources near the former refinery: The
20	Point Breeze Remediation System, the
21	Belmont Terminal Remediation System and
22	Holding Tank, and the Maiden Lane
23	Remediation System.
24	The facility is not a major
25	stationary source as defined in Title 1,

1	Part D of the Clean Air Act Amendments,
2	and is therefore subject to the
3	operating permit requirements adopted in
4	25 Pa Code, Chapter 127, Subchapter G.
5	The Department is holding this hearing
6	to allow all interested parties to
7	testify with comments on this operating
8	permit application. This hearing is
9	being recorded and transcribed.
10	Please state your name
11	including the spelling, your
12	neighborhood or address, whatever you're
13	comfortable with, and whom you represent
14	for the record before you begin. Let me
15	hear testimony to approximately 10
16	minutes. We may be able to if you
17	have more to say, at the end we may be
18	able to get back to you if we have time.
19	Each organization shall designate one
20	witness to present testimony, so you can
21	be a little lax on that.
22	Following your testimony, we
23	may need to ask you for additional
24	information. This hearing will not be a
25	question-and-answer session. However, I

1	can assure you that we will address all
2	comments and questions concerning this
3	operating permit before any
4	determinations are made to issue it.
5	All oral or written comments received
6	will be part of the public record.
7	We will prepare a response
8	document prior to final action on this
9	operating permit. It will be sent to
10	attendees and commenters who we have
11	addresses for. Okay. We are going to
12	start the oral comments now.
13	And oh, Mary Joy, we're
14	allowing 10 minutes. Can you time
15	please?
16	MS. ULATOWSKI: Yes, 10
17	minutes.
18	MR. WIENER: And we are
19	starting. First up is Peter Winslow.
20	MR. WINSLOW: (Muted).
21	MR. WIENER: Peter, you're
22	unmuted now. Sorry about that.
23	MR. WINSLOW: Thank you.
24	Thanks, Ed. I'm speaking on behalf of A
25	SMART Collaboration and I'm not going to
1	

1	take up 10 minutes. I just want to make
2	an observation for you, your management
3	services and for Evergreen not in terms
4	of the purpose of the permit, but the
5	timing of this particular application
6	because under Act 2, we have not seen
7	the Fate & Transport Reports, and we
8	don't have indication of the
9	environmental remediation that's going
10	to be taken overall for the property.
11	Changes to the operating
12	permits for the remediation facility
13	that are currently there I think should
14	remain in place until a proper time for
15	the re-evaluation when we have
16	information about the entire system that
17	will be employed to do remediation at
18	the site.
19	So as a matter of sensitivity
20	to the public and a recognition that
21	because of the past history of the
22	operation of the refinery, the trust of
23	the public and Sunoco, the parent of
24	Evergreen, and the ways in which this
25	property has been regulated in the past,

1	that trust level is very low.
2	So rather than exacerbate that
3	situation, I would recommend that
4	changes even though the price per
5	million is 0 for years in some of the
6	facilities, the older facilities, I
7	would recommend that this is not the
8	right time to be lessening the total
9	oversight of remediation at the
10	property. Those are my only comments.
11	Thank you.
12	MR. WIENER: Thanks, Peter. I
13	forget. Did you spell your name and
14	your organization?
15	MR. WINSLOW: Oh, I'm sorry.
16	Peter Winslow, P-e-t-e-r, W-i-n-s-l-o-w.
17	The organization is A SMART
18	Collaboration, A, S-M-A-R-T, all caps,
19	C-o-l-l-a-b-o-r-a-t-i-o-n, LLC.
20	MR. WIENER: Thank you. Next
21	up we have Russell Zerbo.
22	MR. ZERBO: Thanks, Mr. Wiener.
23	That is right. Russell Zerbo,
24	R-u-s-s-e-l-l, Z-e-r-b-o. I'm an
25	advocate with the nonprofit Clean Air

1	Council in Philadelphia, and I also live
2	at 1330 South Melville, 19143 right on
3	the other side of the Grays Ferry
4	Bridge, so pretty close to the site.
5	And I will also keep my comments
6	extremely brief.
7	Clean Air Council is simply
8	requesting that air monitoring not stop
9	as it's currently being proposed, both
10	at the Point Breeze Remediation System
11	and the Belmont Terminal Remediation
12	System, and that reason is very
13	specific. I know that the air quality
14	data previously done has been very, very
15	low, extremely low.
16	But because the Belmont System
17	and the Point Breeze System both take in
18	vapors from the Packer Avenue and 26th
19	Street sewer, that's where the Point
20	Breeze takes vapors from and the Belmont
21	Terminal takes in vapors from the Shunk
22	Street sewer. And because we know from
23	Evergreen's previous Act 2 filings, that
24	all of these sewers leak. And with the
25	anticipation of increased land

1	disturbance at the site both from
2	remediation and redevelopment, the
3	likelihood that these incredibly aged
4	sewers will continue to leak and
5	possibly leak in a more extreme way,
6	that will undoubtedly impact underground
7	pollution at the site, disturbing it.
8	And it just seems incredibly premature
9	to stop monitoring it at these two
10	systems when we know that such big
11	changes are going to be taking place at
12	the site.
13	Helco just put out a statement
14	saying that redevelopment will take
15	approximate 15 years and we want this
16	monitoring to continue, as that is being
17	done because of the risk of damaging
18	those sewers and unearthing new
19	pollution issues. And that's it, we
20	just want air monitoring to continue
21	both at the Point Breeze Remediation
22	System and the Belmont Terminal
23	Remediation System because of the
24	uncertainty around the sewer system.
25	And I thank you all for this time.

1	MR. WIENER: Thank you. Okay.
2	I do not see anybody else either in the
3	question or chat having requested to
4	speak.
5	Anyone else out there, please
6	send a quick note and questions and a
7	quick note in chat or raise your hand if
8	you're struggling with finding the right
9	place. I will give people a few seconds
10	just to be safe. Going once, going
11	twice. Okay oh, wait a minute. I'm
12	sorry. Was there a hand raised that I
13	missed? Okay. If you had a hand
14	raised, please keep it up.
15	Okay. I see Craig Mele
16	Melidosian. Sorry for missing any
17	okay. You're self-muted. Okay. You
18	should be able to speak now if you'd
19	like to.
20	MR. MELIDOSIAN: Thank you,
21	Edward. Craig, C-r-a-i-g, last name
22	Melidosian, M-e-l-i-d-o-s-i-a-n. I'm
23	with the Ward 40 Republicans, P.O. Box
24	3355, Philadelphia, Pa 19142. We
25	comprise all of the entire Lower

1	Southwest Planning District, and I'd
2	like to indicate that we would like to
3	see the monitoring continue unless
4	there's an extraordinary financial
5	hardship that should preclude this.
6	We think that with the amount
7	of construction that's going on,
8	flooding that may be exacerbated, we
9	think that this is a prudent way to
10	proceed. That is with the continued
11	monitoring. Thank you.
12	MR. WIENER: Okay. Thank you.
13	Now, we have Lisa Hastings. You should
14	be able to speak now.
15	MS. HASTINGS: Can you hear me?
16	MR. WIENER: I can, yes.
17	MS. HASTINGS: Hi. I'm Lisa
18	Hastings, and I'm speaking for myself
19	and as the Chair of the EJ Committee for
20	the Pennsylvania Legal Women Voters
21	Environment Committee. I agree with the
22	prior speakers, that the air monitoring
23	should continue and Evergreen's permit
24	should not be exempted from either
25	monitoring or emissions limitations.

1	If the City is planning to
2	require other air monitoring, to require
3	comprehensive ongoing monitoring at the
4	site another way, well, maybe it's okay.
5	But I'm not aware that the City is
6	looking at any other monitoring.
7	Although the emissions being monitored
8	near these facilities may currently show
9	few emissions, these treatment
10	facilities are not the only source of
11	potential pollution on this site.
12	As you know, active remediation
13	work will be ongoing on this site for
14	some time, and it's inexcusable to just
15	assume that air quality emissions won't
16	occur. Maybe they won't, but that needs
17	to be proven on an ongoing basis as long
18	as remediation is happening. It's not
19	over yet and we can't just pretend that
20	this is the only source of potential
21	emissions on this site.
22	If the emission limits and
23	monitoring are removed, of course no one
24	will know whether or not levels stayed
25	low, and this will further erode the

1	trust that this environmental justice
2	community has for the City and for the
3	business community. The only reason to
4	exempt Evergreen from emission limits or
5	not to require monitoring is to, and
6	this is what will be thought, either
7	hide the true state of the air quality
8	or to raise questions about the
9	integrity of AMS and Evergreen by giving
10	the perception that it's hiding
11	something.
12	If there's nothing to hide, why
13	open yourself up for criticism. Please
14	do your part to try to rebuild trust
15	with the neighborhoods and retain the
16	monitoring of emissions and limits.
17	Thank you.
18	MR. WIENER: Okay. Thank you.
19	Okay. Just skimming through here, I am
20	not seeing any new hands raised or any
21	new questions or comments. We'll do it
22	again. Going once, going twice. Okay.
23	I believe that's all we have.
24	Having no more comments, we are
25	ending the public hearing. Thank you
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             all for your time.
