COVER LETTER

Ballinger respectfully submits on behalf of the Department of Public Property the following presentation for consideration by the City of Philadelphia Art Commission. Our intent is to pursue Concept Approval. The estimated construction cost for this project is \$30 million dollars.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The North Central Public Safety Building includes a new 22nd Police District facility along with a Police Athletic League (PAL) Center and a shared Community Room to create a place to bring together the community and police to further community service and trust. The new building and adjacent outdoor park spaces will create a positive experience for visitors and staff while enhancing the quality of life of for members of the surrounding community and improve response times for the Police Department in this district. The project site is a series of three derelict parcels at the western limit of the Diamond Street Historic District. This important neighborhood in North Philadelphia includes stately row homes and several elaborate churches that were built between 1875 and 1897.

The building will house police functions that are necessary to serve the community including a public desk and reception area, juvenile aid and community relation services, administrative offices, and a community room. In addition to the Police Department program, the building will include a new PAL Center. This PAL Center will include a climate controlled multi-purpose court, separate homework, computer, and video game rooms. There will also be a common game area with open views to the multi-purpose court and other interior program spaces.

Public art is to be integrated to the exterior of the three parcels that comprise this facility. This art is intended reinforce the connection to the Diamond Street Historic District, achieve the practical necessity of screening and separation of sensitive operational areas, and create a neighborhood amenity.

The City has identified numerous project goals expressed by the Mayor, the PPD and the DPP. Below are three key project criteria including urban design, community and security, which inform the project's measures of success.

- A sustainable urban design approach that knits together the physical fabric of the community
- Creation of a safe and active environment that joins the community and law enforcement in common ground
- Design of an enduring civic facility with an emphasis on security to protect and benefit its inhabitants and the neighborhood.















Re: Letter of Intent for Percent for Art at North Central Public Safety Building

Dear Alex:

The Office of Arts, Culture and the Creative Economy (OACCE) would like to inform the Philadelphia Art Commission of our intent to provide a Percent for Art opportunity in collaboration with the City's Department of Public Property (DPP) at the proposed new North Central Public Safety Building. The North Central Public Safety Building will be located at 2100 Diamond Street in Philadelphia's 22nd Police District and is considered part of the Diamond Street Historic District. The project occupies three parcels fronting Diamond Street between North Lambert and North 22nd Street, with a new two story building and two adjacent parcels consisting primarily of surface parking screened by outdoor public space. In addition to the police department program, the building will include a basketball gym and spaces in support of the Police Athletic League's PAL Center programs. Due to the City's current Percent for Art projects that are underway, the timeline for this future Percent for Art project is still being determined with OACCE and DPP. Below is an overview of our anticipated understanding and approach for this project:

- The Percent for Art opportunity for the North Central Public Safety Building will create a beautiful and enduring work of public art that is permanent, site-specific, and reflects the culture, values and diversity of the City of Philadelphia. The Art budget will be at least 1% of the total project budget in keeping with the City's Percent for Art guidelines.
- A project specific Percent for Art Committee will be formed to advise the selection of the artist and the art proposal and will include representatives from: the Design team; Philadelphia Police Department, Police Athletic League, Department of Public Property, community representatives, elected officials, and OACCE.
- The Artist will be selected through a two-part open Call for Artists competition, consisting of Phase 1 where artists submit qualifications, and a subsequent Phase 2 where 4 finalists who have been selected by the Committee will move forward with providing proposals. Stakeholder involvement will be a critical component, and artist teams will be encouraged to align their proposal with feedback and input from members of the public. Public engagement will occur in virtual and/or in-person meetings, and through online public surveys. The Committee will review all proposals and the public's feedback to select one winning finalist artist or artist team.
- OACCE will provide oversight for the Percent for Art process from concept to installation and will work with the
 artist and project team to ensure the technical details for the artwork are coordinated with the site. Once the
 winning artist is selected and the artwork has been developed, OACCE will initiate a separate review process with
 the Philadelphia Art Commission for approving the artwork.

We look forward to working with the Department of Public Property, the North Central Public Safety Building project team and all stakeholders to realize a beautiful, site-specific public artwork that will be a long lasting contribution to the Police Department, Police Athletic League and North Philadelphia community, and will enhance the City's renowned collection of public art.
