Focus: John C. Anderson Cultural Center (PPR)

- Assess stairs and shore them up temporarily
- ✓ Investigate building envelope for leaks
- Remove damaged stone on roof and excavate foundation to assess for leaks
- Scope Investigations Underway
 - Permanent stair improvements
 - Roof improvements
 - Building exterior facade waterproofing



Updates: John C. Anderson Cultural Center (PPR)

Preliminary Findings of the Water Infiltration Assessment:


- Coping stones around roof have open joints and improper slope for drainage
- Column areas in brick wall have no flashing
- Brick walls have improper flashing at base
- Window area flashing is failing
- Below grade water barrier is failing

Focus: Wynnefield Library (FLP)

- Fix basement water leak by adding valve in sidewalk
- Install new lobby flooring
- New roof
- Design for courtyard improvements, including partial wall replacement and ADA accessibility upgrades (for discussion today!)




Wynnefield Library Timeline

Improvement	Next Steps
New steps to the basement	Replace temporary stairs with permanent stairs
Repair wall, floor and ceiling in large basement room due to water leak & mildew	First step is to complete exterior envelope work and then mold remediation will be done.
Replace leaky roof and roof drains	Roof drains were jetted and scoped, now draining properly. Addition repairs to roof as needed.
Replace floor in large room in basement	May be done in some areas depending on remediation needs
Downstairs bathroom often doesn't work	
Replace pump to prevent flooding and overflowing after heavy rains	Rebuild is following up with Philadelphia Parks and Recreation about these concerns and will then update stakeholders
Replace boiler, central AC, refrigerator, and freezer

Seating for families and individuals – groups or single Tall, flowering plants outside of JCA's window, improve view from the center






Visioning -


Possibility #1: Terrace + Sloped Lawn



- Tables and chairs around the edges with a grassy lawn in the center
- Can be used for:
 - Events on the lawn
 - > Picnics
 - Games and activities (ex. cornhole), free-play




Possibility #2: Expanded Terrace + Movie Wall



- Expanded seating area with a grassy lawn and a movie wall
- Can be used for:
 - Movies
 - Events on the lawn and terrace
 - Picnics
 - Games and activities (ex. cornhole), free-play



Possibility #3: Gathering Garden



- Sloped lawn and gathering area with seating that faces the library
- Can be used for:
 - Gardening/plant programs
 - Events on the lawn
 - Picnics
 - Games and activities (ex. cornhole), free-play



Possibility #4: Library Grove



- Paved seating area, like an "outdoor room" of the Library
- Can be used for:
 - Events in the "grove"
 - Picnics
 - Games and activities (ex. ping-pong, bocce, chess)



#3: Gathering Garden


Paved area – is it needed for events like concerts?
