SUBJECT: Request for Art Commission Administrative Review of Harriet Tubman Statue Plaque Text

Dear Alex:

The Office of Arts, Culture, and the Creative Economy (OACCE) is submitting the attached Harriet Tubman statue plaque text to be reviewed at the Administrative level during the February 14, 2024 Philadelphia Art Commission meeting. This submission is in response to the Commissioners' request to see the plaque text during the January 10, 2024 meeting where Philadelphia's Harriet Tubman statue by Alvin Pettit, titled "A Higher Power: The Call of a Freedom Fighter," received final Art Commission approval.

Attached, please find the proposed plaque text, consisting of the artwork's title, the artist's name, installation date, the artwork materials and a description of Alvin Pettit's statue. The plaque will be 18"x24", fabricated in bronze and will be recessed in the pavers next to the statue. The plaque fabrication will be consistent with OACCE's standards for public art plaques and will be visually consistent with the existing plaques at City Hall.

The plaque text will include a QR code and website address which OACCE will use to continue engaging the public with exciting ways to talk about Harriet Tubman's contributions throughout the year during Black History Month, Women's History Month, Harriet Tubman's Birthday, Juneteenth, Fourth of July, the anniversary date of the installment of Philadelphia's Harriet Tubman statue, the upcoming semi-quincentennial, and other appropriate times in order to shine a spotlight on Harriet Tubman's life, legacy and ties to Philadelphia.

The plaque text will also be featured on the website, which will provide an opportunity for the text to be translated into multiple languages as suggested by the Philadelphia Art Commission.


