MEETING OF THE PHILADELPHIA ART COMMISSION

 Project Details: Playground and site improvements
 Applicant: Philadelphia Parks & Recreation (PPR)

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Philadelphia Parks and Recreation is seeking administrative approval for site and playground improvements at Cliveden Park in Northwest Philadelphia. The scope of work includes installing new safety surface, replacement of several pieces of play equipment, new concrete pathways, new seating options and a new trash receptacle. No trees or vegetation, other than a small portion of turf grass is being removed or disrupted as part of this work. Outreach and community engagement occurred via a public meeting as well as an online survey – helping to decide on an initial design and the overall color scheme of the project.

Seeing no questions or comments from the Commission or the Public, Chairperson Roesch asked for a motion (00:05:22).

Upon the motion made by Commissioner Nasser and seconded by Commissioner Kenyatta.

The vote was taken by consensus.

The Commission voted unanimously approval for site and playground improvements at Cliveden Park Playground.

 Review Type: Public Art
 Project Details: Plaque for new Public Art on City property
 Applicant: Office of Arts, Culture, and the Creative Economy (OACCE)

The Office of Arts Culture and the Creative Economy (also known as OACCE) is seeking administrative approval for the Harriet Tubman Statue Plaque at today's meeting. At the January 10, 2024, Art Commission meeting, the Harriet Tubman statue proposed by Alvin Pettit received final Art Commission approval. At the January meeting, the Commission requested to see the finalized location and language of the associated plaque at a future date.

The proposed plaque will consist of the artwork's title, artist's name, installation date, the artwork materials, and a description of the statue. The plaque will be 18 inches by 24 inches, fabricated in bronze and will be recessed into the pavers next to the statue. The plaque will be visually consistent with other plaques at City Hall. Finally, the plaque will include a QR code and website address which OACCE will use to further engage the public throughout the year and provide an opportunity for the text to be translated into other languages.

 Applicant: Office of Arts, Culture, and the Creative Economy (OACCE)

The Office of Arts Culture and the Creative Economy (also known as OACCE) is seeking administrative approval of conservation work for 9 (nine) City of Philadelphia owned public art sculptures to take place during 2024. The work will be performed by professional conservators who have annual on-call contracts with the City. Four of the pieces required emergency or time-sensitive conservation work that is either in process or already completed. This list of projects was provided and posted online, with a description of each piece.

Chairperson Roesch made a brief comment on how impressed he was with Philadelphia Public Art conservation efforts (00:13:47).

Seeing no questions or comments from the Commission or the Public, Chairperson Roesch asked for a motion (00:14:10).

Upon the motion made by Commissioner Nasser and seconded by Commissioner *McEneaney*.

The vote was taken by consensus.

The Commission voted unanimously for administrative approval of conservation work for nine (9) City of Philadelphia owned public art sculptures to take place during 2024.

Pedro Pinto, of the Department of Public Property, spoke about the engagement process and how the building has changed based on feedback.

Ruth Birchett, of Heritage Community Development Corporation, noted support for the project.

Mr. Smith read a comment into the record from Donell Deans, 32nd Ward Leader and Vice President of St. Elizabeth RCO who was in support of the project and did a survey of the community (00:40:14).

Block Captain Gail Loney expressed concerns about the project, highlighting negative encounters with staff of the 22nd District and suggested more conversations occur before approval.

Pastor Turner stated that he had never been advised of any meetings that has taken place, his church and congregation were noted as being across the street from the proposed location.

Jacqueline Wiggins spoke about community engagement. Mr. Pinto responded about outreach and meeting with members of the community.

Commissioner Nasser asked what the position of City Councilmember was, and Mr. Pinto replied, that both Council and the Mayor supports this project (00:52:08).

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Mr. Smith read a comment into the record from Allison Weiss, who requested to please take an opportunity to unite and not divide and allow the community to all be heard (00:52:39).

Commissioner Kenyatta provided clarification to the charge of the Art Commission and purview in detail specifically the task to review the design and location of any project on City land (00:53:22). Additional comments were made by Commissioner McEneaney. who agreed with Commissioner Kenyatta and Commissioner Lowe, who pointed out other areas for opportunities for artists to be engaged with the community on the project from slide 16 of the presentation.

Seeing no further questions or comments from the Commission or Public, Chairperson Roesch asked for a motion (00:58:29).

Upon the motion made by Commissioner Nasser and seconded by Commissioner Lowe.

The slopes don't exceed ADA requirements, and the site is ADA compliant. Further discussion continued about the planting structures and soil volumes.
