

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT – DISASTER RECOVERY (CDBG-DR) Engagement Recap

November 14, 2023

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SECTION 1. Background

In September of 2021, the remnants of Hurricane Ida hit

Philadelphia. This resulted in major property damage and extensive flooding. In response to Ida, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) allocated \$163,204,000 in Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery funding to support long-term recovery and hazard mitigation efforts.

In order to design Hurricane Ida Recovery programs and activities that meaningfully benefit vulnerable and impacted residents, the City engaged community members in a variety of ways to ensure effective outreach. The City published the <u>CDBG-DR Action Plan</u> and held a 30-day public comment period from July 14, 2023 to August 15, 2023. Two public hearings (one in-person and one virtual) were also held on August 8, 2023, to encourage resident feedback.

The City will continue outreach and engagement throughout the six-year life of the CDBG- DR program. Below is a snapshot of the engagement efforts we have used so far.

CDBG-DR funds are primarily intended to support vulnerable Philadelphia residents most impacted by Hurricane Ida. The City's CDBG-DR Action Plan details how funding will be allocated to various programs, including:

- Housing
- Infrastructure
- Mitigation
- Planning
- Economic revitalization
- Public services

SECTION 2. Outreach Efforts

CDBG-DR engagement has consisted of multiple forms of outreach and has led to feedback from over 900 Philadelphia residents so far. Our outreach has included a City-wide survey, small-group discussion sessions, print and social media advertisements, as well as meetings and communications with relevant stakeholders.

These efforts (that can be seen in more detail below) create a robust and holistic outreach process that will continue as we work towards implementing CDBG-DR activities.

2.1 Philadelphia Voices Survey

The Philadelphia Voices Survey was a city-wide survey conducted by the Mayor's Policy Office in June 2023 in order to gain input from Philadelphia residents on various issues, including Hurricane Ida impacts. The survey yielded a sample size of 801 respondents and has a margin of error of +/- 2.45%. Results of the survey are shown below.

2.2 Neighborhood Advisory Committees (NACs)

The City analyzed verified property loss data from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to determine which zip-codes were most impacted by Hurricane Ida. As part of our effective outreach strategy, the City engaged NACs serving five of the most impacted Philadelphia zip codes (as measured by number of FEMA Individual Assistance claims) to obtain feedback, better understand community needs, and begin collaborating with residents. In collaboration with these five NACs, the City conducted small-group meetings that were attended by NAC staff, Neighborhood Advisory Subcommittee (NAS) members, and interested community residents. The Participating NACs included:

- Hispanic Association of Contractors & Enterprises (HACE)
- Hunting Park Neighborhood Advisory Committee
- Strawberry Mansion Neighborhood Action Center, Inc.
- Greater Philadelphia Social Service Center (GPASS)
- <u>The Enterprise Center CDC</u>




Figure 2: Map of Most Ida Impacted Zip Codes in Philadelphia






Figure 3: Word Cloud of Small Group NAC Themes. Most commonly expressed words/phrases are larger in size

Key Themes:

When analyzing feedback from the 70+ residents who participated in NAC small group meetings, key themes emerged. The impacts of Hurricane Ida were profound. Many residents experienced flooded basements that affected their daily lives and voiced the need for assistance. Other residents were affected by fallen trees during the storm and called for better city maintenance via 311 to ensure reduced impacts going forward. Residents also recognized that having an older home can compound the negative impacts of storm events – worsening direct impacts and reducing future resilience. Issues with older housing stock can further compound the cost burden of recovery for economically insecure residents.

In the storm response realm, residents identified key areas of concern. Many residents encountered problems with obtaining insurance or raising premiums in the aftermath of Ida, impacting their ability to repair damages and feel secure in the face of future storm events. Additionally, there was widespread frustration with the aid/disaster recovery process amongst small group meeting participants. Individuals expressed disappointment with the amount of aid provided from the City and federal partners, as well as confusion about how aid was dispersed. These concerns overlap with calls for more transparency and effective engagement of community members in the aid process. Participants also discussed issues for renters in Philadelphia – specifically related to landlord retaliation. Renters were concerned that landlords may retaliate against tenants who seek out aid by raising rents or even kicking tenants out of properties. Multiple residents floated the idea of not providing aid to landlords with histories of L&I violations/past abuses.

For next steps, residents asked for more information on FEMA applicants who did not receive assistance. A variety of factors influence which applicants receive FEMA assistance, so residents voiced the need for transparency and follow-up with applicants. Residents also expressed dissatisfaction with current city resources and voiced interest in a greater level of community involvement in CDBG-DR programming. Some residents called for a larger role of NACs and Community Development Corporations (CDCs) in CDBG-DR project intake and monitoring. One resident detailed a "Resident Task Force" model that would consist of community members (block captains, community leaders, etc.) from the most impacted areas of Philadelphia. These NAC/CDC funded Task Force Groups would be on the ground to address issues in CDBG-DR programming and focus on community education. This model could empower community members and better ensure effective design and implementation of CDBG-DR programs going forward.

2.3 Stakeholder Meetings and Consultations

In addition to engaging with community members, consultations with organizations and City departments are also vital to ensuring CDBG-DR programming reflects the unique needs of vulnerable Philadelphians. So far, the City has introduced and explained the CDBG-DR Action Plan to 21 Community Based Organizations. These organizations include volunteer organizations, various CDCs and NACs, university partners, and many more. When analyzing outreach done to public sector partners, 47 entities have been engaged – including but not limited to transportation agencies, offices for elected officials, utilities departments, public health offices, and disaster recovery partners.

These organizations and affiliates will continue to be a vital part of how we best connect Hurricane Ida Recovery programming with the lived experience and needs of Philadelphia residents. A full list of stakeholder meetings and consultations is included in the Appendix.

2.3.1 Eastwick Engagement

Eastwick is an environmental justice community in Southwest Philadelphia facing multiple environmental burdens including a federally designated Superfund site (Clearview Landfill), the largest oil refinery on the Eastern Seaboard (now closed), and noise and air pollution from major highways (I-95 and I-76) and the Philadelphia International Airport. One of the most significant environmental challenges in Eastwick is flooding; Eastwick is the lowest lying neighborhood in Philadelphia and has historically experienced severe riverine flooding but is vulnerable to multiple sources of flooding due to climate change. Flooding of both Cobbs and Darby Creeks on the west side of the community is of greatest concern, but during coastal storms like Hurricane Ida, water levels in the Delaware and Schuylkill Rivers rise as well. Sea level rise will make it harder for water to drain and may eventually cause water to pond in some areas, even on sunny days.

In 2022, the City initiated a place-based program called "Eastwick: from Recovery to Resilience" to align City, State, and Federal efforts to improve community well-being in Eastwick through actions informed by Eastwick's history, present context, and residents' vision for a resilient future. Through this initiative and with deep collaboration with Eastwick community leaders and agency partners, the City has identified priority areas for short- and long-term investment and action. These priorities were further verified in a May 2023 focus group around unmet needs. Based on ongoing engagement, priorities include prevention of flood damage through resilience measures, preparedness for future disasters via planning, and recovery from storm impacts.

2.3.2 Economic Revitalization Engagement:

Of its total \$163M CDBG-DR allocation, the City will spend \$5M on economic recovery and long-term resilience activities. This includes grants for businesses who incurred business losses or structural damage after Ida.

The CDBG-DR Program Team held a series of engagement events in collaboration with the Commerce Department in Manayunk and East Falls in Fall 2023 and Winter 2024. According to Small Business Administration data, those two neighborhoods had the highest dollar amounts of Total Verified Losses in the City after Ida.

The purpose of the events was to inform business owners about future CDBG-DR assistance and to learn more about business recovery and resilience Unmet Needs. Additionally, business owners provided feedback on Economic Revitalization program proposed by the CDBG-DR Program Team and the Commerce Department. The events were hosted and supported by Manayunk Development Corporation and East Falls Development Corporation.

2.4 Public Comment Period and Hearings

In line with HUD standards and City of Philadelphia best practices, a 30-day public comment period was open and advertised in order to allow public feedback on the CDBG- DR Action Plan. The public comment period was open from July 14, 2023, to August 15, 2023. Philadelphians were able to email CDBG-DR@phila.gov with comments or send physical mail with comments to the City's CDBG-DR office. **83 written comments were received during the public comment period**.

In addition to the 30-day comment period, two public hearings were held on August 8, 2023 –one remote over zoom and one in person at 1234 Market Street. Across these 2 public hearings, **14 oral comments from community members were given. In total, the public comment period and hearings yielded 97 comments from Philadelphia residents.** These 97 comments were analyzed and coded for key themes – the most common of which are included below:

- 1. Housing
- 2. Mitigation
- 3. High Cost Burden of Ida Recovery
- 4. Infrastructure
- 5. Eligibility Questions
- 6. Disaster Preparedness
- 7. Sanitation Issues
- 8. Renter's Issues

Outreach to advertise the comment period and public hearing was done through email blasts, word of mouth, newspaper advertisements, and social media. Screenshots of the public comment coding are included below:




