




MacArthur Safety and Justice Challenge




In 2016, Philadelphia received \$3.5 million dollars as part of the MacArthur Foundation's Safety and Justice Challenge - a national initiative to decrease local jail populations and address racial, ethnic, and economic disparities in the criminal justice system. Philadelphia implemented a number of collaborative reform measures with justice and behavioral health partners. Efforts to achieve a 50% reduction in the city's prison population were bolstered by an additional \$4 million dollars awarded in October 2018. To date, Philadelphia's prison population is down 42.4% from 8,082 in July 2015 (Baseline) to 4,653 in March 2024. This summary report provides a high level glance at progress by comparing the current population to baseline data.

Note: All Philadelphia detainer categories also include those issued on special probation cases at the request of Pennsylvania State Parole. A sentencing judge may request, while retaining their decision-making power, the Pennsylvania Parole Board to supervise certain people released from state custody, known as 'special probation' cases.


