Made possible by the Philadelphia Beverage Tax, Rebuild is investing hundreds of millions of dollars into neighborhood parks, recreation centers, and libraries.

Addressing years of deferred maintenance and lack of investment, Rebuild is reviving the community spaces that residents rely on, and communities thrive in.

ENGAGEMENT & DESIGN

Rebuild prioritizes community input at every stage of the design process, ensuring **feedback from site** users and community members of all ages shapes the final design of each renovation.

Rebuild and Project Users (non-profit partners) engage communities through surveys, individual stakeholder interviews, and events ranging in scale from small focus groups to large public community meetings, school visits, interactive workshops, and pop-up outreach at community events. During construction, stakeholders are kept up to date on progress via call, text, and email.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

TRAINING PROGRAMS

Rebuild's skilled trades training programs require no prior experience in the construction industry and offer paid **(\$15/hour)**, hands-on training and experience needed to pursue a union apprenticeship. With over 77% apprenticeship placement for graduates to date, Rebuild is demonstrating the potency of a skilled trades-focused workforce development model.



Construction Apprentice Preparatory Program (CAPP) - Beginning in December, this part-time, multi-trade hybrid, 16-week training pre-apprenticeship program prepared 18 Philadelphia residents to pass the Building Trades Entrance exams for the following trades: Electrician, Ironworkers, Insulators, Cement Mason, Sheetmetal Workers, and Finishing Trades. A second CAPP cohort will begin in late April.

Rebuild's **Carpentry** and **Masonry Academies** began in March at Eastern State Penitentiary providing paid training in carpentry and masonry for 20 diverse Philadelphia residents.


BUSINESS SUPPORTS

EVP assists minority and women owned businesses with obtaining their Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) or Women Business Enterprise (WBE) certification.

Rebuild Ready provides businesses with the knowledge, skills, & resources needed to bid on Rebuild or other public works projects. The program also provides mentoring, ranging from blueprint reading, assistance with bonding and insurance, back office support, and more.

Contract Participation

Rebuild prioritizes diversity in all contracting from design services to the construction site. The bars on the graphs below represent committed and spent dollars on contracts initiated by Rebuild (as opposed to inherited contracts) and show Rebuild exceeding all goals. Rebuild expects spending to align with contract commitments.







WORKFORCE PARTICIPATION

Thirty-nine percent of journeyperson-level work hours have been completed by people of color. Rebuild is meeting the goal for work hours by Hispanic journeypersons and is under for African-American and Asian. Rebuild continues to focus its outreach efforts and diversity policies to meet its workforce participation goals.



FINANCE

FUNDING SOURCES

The table below shows anticipated funding for Rebuild, including the November 2018 bond issuance made possible by the Philadelphia Beverage Tax. Bond funds and funding from the City's capital budget support design and construction at Rebuild sites. Grant funding, including the William Penn Foundation's historic commitment of up to \$100 million, supports design and construction as well as costs that are not capital eligible, including Rebuild's diversity and inclusion programs, community engagement, and operations.

^{*}Executed grants are those that have advanced past the award stage and have disbursed funds to WPF's Donor Advised Fund, PAID or other repository. Many funders will award a specific grant amount, but will disburse those committed or awarded funds over the course of several months or years. The executed amount shown here reflects actual and projected disbursements.

COMMITTED AND EXPENDED FUNDS

To date, total Rebuild expenditures are \$149.2M; this represents an increase of \$11.7M from the January '24 Report. The table below shows the total funds that are committed via a grant or contract for project improvements and program administration.

The November 2018 bond issuance made \$86.5M available for projects. Total committed utilized these funds and will also use funds from future bond issues.
