

CITY BUDGET

Mayor Cherelle L. Parker's \$6.8 Billion "One Philly Budget 2.0" and FY26-30 Five Year Plan



HOUSING \$800M

in borrowings for a historic investment in **Housing Opportunities Made Easy (H.O.M.E.) Initiative** to build or preserve 30,000 housing units



ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY \$210M in the FYP

in historic, unprecedented **Business** and **Wage tax reductions** during and beyond the Five Year Plan to make Philadelphia more competitive and to create jobs



2026 PREPARATIONS \$100M

in General Fund investment to prepare for special events in 2026 — including America's 250th Birthday — in neighborhoods across Philadelphia, as well as \$500M in investments at the Philadelphia International Airport



PUBLIC SAFETY

Ongoing investments in **Police and Office of Public Safety** have helped drive historic reductions in gun violence, supporting **community policing, body cameras and drones, anti-violence grants** for community partners, and numerous other critical needs



WELLNESS \$216M in operating and **\$75M** in new capital

for supportive housing, clinical services, and medical care for those with histories of substance use disorder, mental or behavioral health, or homelessness





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WORKFORCE

\$10M in FY26 on top of the \$10M investment in FY25 for workforce development anchored from the first-in-the-nation **City College for Municipal Employment**



CLEAN & GREEN

Continued investments in citywide cleaning programs that have covered 109,123 city blocks and commercial corridors, and targeting illegal dumping with increased fines and nearly 640 surveillance cameras by end of FY25



EDUCATION

Expanding number of public and charter schools from 25 to 40 with Extended Day/Extended Year enrichment programming – providing another 5,000+ slots for students The FYP also invests \$12M for teacher salaries starting in FY30



FISCAL HEALTH

Pension Fund is 65% funded, with estimated savings of at least \$430M/year in the General Fund in FY33 when the system is fully funded. The City meets its reserve targets in each year of the FYP, with the Budget Stabilization Reserve to reach \$280M over the Proposed Plan



\$550M in Labor Reserve

as the City negotiates fair, fiscally responsible, multi-year agreements with unionized workforce

Other key investments:

- Vision Zero: \$5M in FY26 and \$30M through FY31 in capital investments, including speed cushions, line striping, and other traffic safety measures
- SEPTA: \$135M in local share and \$9M in capital investment in FY26 to unlock federal and state funds
- City streets: More than \$500M in capital investments for paving and ADA ramps is also committed through FY31
- Market East: \$750,000 for a planning study to shape a revitalization strategy for this historic corridor

The FY26 Budget and FY26-30 FYP invest millions more for libraries and rec centers, pools and lifeguards, summer camps and local businesses – all core services that Philadelphians can see, touch, and feel.
