

What is Housing Counseling?

Buying a home is the most expensive and long-term investment you'll ever make. Housing counseling prepares you for homeownership by helping you understand the responsibilities of purchasing and owning a home. Currently, more than 25 housing counseling agencies offer free counseling services to first-time buyers and owners of homes in the City of Philadelphia. Eligibility requirements apply.

What types of services are provided?

Professionally trained housing counselors at each agency conduct free group and individual counseling sessions on homeownership topics such as:

- ◆ Mortgage foreclosure prevention
- Personal credit repair and credit maintenance
- Money management through budgeting
- Rights and responsibilities of homeowners
- ◆ The mortgage application and purchase process
- ◆ Financial assistance programs
- Home maintenance
- Real estate tax issues

Is housing counseling available after purchase?

Yes, most housing counseling agencies offer free services after you buy a home including:

- Mortgage delinquency and default counseling
- Foreclosure prevention and intervention counseling
- Identifying and avoiding predatory lending practices

Who is eligible?

To be eligible for free housing counseling, you must live in Philadelphia or be moving to Philadelphia.

How do I apply?

Contact one of the housing counseling agencies listed on the back. Before you call, collect the following information so you can give it to the housing counselor:

- ◆ Amount of total annual household income
- ◆ Source of that income (employment, SSI, DPA, etc.)
- ◆ Number of people in your household

FREE foreclosure prevention assistance

Are you facing foreclosure due to unpaid mortgage, unpaid property taxes and other City liens, or problems with your reverse mortgage? Free foreclosure counseling is available to all Philadelphia homeowners facing foreclosure on their primary residence. There are no income requirements.

FREE eviction prevention assistance

The City of Philadelphia wants evictions to be as rare as possible. Prior to filing to evict a tenant, landlords must participate in the City's Eviction Diversion Program (https://eviction-diversion.phila.gov/#/). This program helps landlords and tenants reach an agreement that works for both parties. It helps tenants avoid evictions and life disruptions, and landlords avoid vacancies and other costs.
