

- A cultural phenomenon, reflecting the grit, determination and resilience of Philadelphians and everyday people.








Rocky Through the Years

- 1982: Originally unveiled at top of Museum steps during Rocky III movie.
- 1982: Relocated to Spectrum Stadium;
- 1987: Brought back to top of Museum steps for filming Mannequin;
- 1990: Back to the top of steps for filming of Rocky V;
- 1993: Once again to the top of steps for filming of *Philadelphia*;
- 2006: Relocated to base of Art Museum steps;
- 2024: 2nd Cast of statue temporarily at top of steps for Rocky Fest;



Requesting to Keep Rocky at the Top

- Rocky 'A' at bottom of steps is City owned;
- Rocky 'B' at top of steps is on loan to Art
 Museum for temporary display;
- Both are original, identical casts of Rocky statue created by the artist (2 of 3 total);
- The City is requesting to keep Rocky 'B' permanently at the top of steps.
- Rocky 'A' at the bottom will be featured in an Exhibit inside the museum in Spring 2026, and then returned to the original donor's private collection.







Clarifications

- Today's request is only for the permanent installation of Rocky B at top of steps.
- The City is exchanging Rocky casts A and B with original donor;
- The exchange of casts does <u>not</u> trigger Art Commission approval or deaccession since:
 - the casts are co-originals of the same statue, by same artist.
 - the City will continue to retain an original Rocky statue in its public art collection.








STATUE LOCATION SITE PLAN







Returning the statue to its original placement would restore the full power of that experience. The top of the steps is where visitors would expect to find Rocky Balboa, with his arms raised in victory and where the message of perseverance resonates most clearly.

The Visitor Center is committed to enriching every traveler's connection to Philadelphia, our values and our culture. We believe this placement will strengthen that mission and enhance this defining element of Philadelphia's visitor experience.
